
## 1 Samuel Chapters 28-31

## **David's Blessing and Saul's Death**

## **Chapter 28-Saul Consults a Medium at Endor**

#### Vs. 1-25

- The Philistines gathered their armies to fight against Israel.
- Since Achish, King of Gath believed David had lost his loyalty to Israel, he promoted David as his **bodyguard** (Compare this to Psalm 118:8).
- King Achish expected David to fight against Israel.

- The Philistines camped at Shunem while Saul camped at Gilboa.
- The size of the Philistine camp terrified Saul (Compare Saul's fearfulness to Psalm 118:5-8).

- Saul inquired of the Lord, but the Lord <u>did not</u> answer, whether by dreams or by the prophets.
- Sometimes the Lord spoke through the priest using the <u>Urim</u> and <u>Thummim</u>. The
  priest wore these stones in a pouch. The Lord might have used the Urim and
  Thummim to relay His message by casting lots.




**Urim and Thummim**

- Prophets, sometimes called seers, could foretell the future.
- Prophets would also declare the Word of the Lord even when the people did not want to hear it.
- Since the Lord did not speak to Saul, he sought out a medium in the Philistine territory of <u>Endor</u>.





- The use of Mediums violated God's Law and Saul removed them from Israel (Leviticus 19:31; 20:27).
- Saul did not want the Philistines or the medium to recognize him, so Saul <u>disguised</u> himself.
- The medium asked Saul who she should bring up and Saul answered, "Samuel."
- Samuel's appearance terrified the medium, and she instantly recognized Saul.
- The medium believed Saul had tricked her and would put her to death. Saul, however, promised not to harm her.
- The medium described Samuel's appearance and Saul immediately recognized Samuel.
- Saul asked Samuel about the next day's battle.
- Samuel told Saul since he had <u>disobeyed</u> the Lord, both he and his sons would die in battle and Israel would fall to the Philistines.
- Much debate has surfaced as to whether God actually raised Samuel from the dead.
- Scripture clearly states God had stopped talking with Saul (1 Samuel 7:6).
- Satan and his demons have powers as mentioned in Ephesians 6:12).
- One should never entertain the powers of demonic forces.
- After hearing the message, Saul fell to the floor in terror.

- Both the medium and Saul's servants encouraged him to eat.
- After Saul ate, he went away.
- Interestingly, Saul never <u>repented</u>. Jesus states in John 16:7-8, the Holy Spirit convicts the world of sin. If the Holy does not convict, then one has no desire to repent.
- The Holy Spirit had left Saul, therefore, no repentance.
- What a dreadful state for any unbeliever who rejects the spirit time and time again (Matthew 12:31-32; Hebrews 10:31).

### **Chapter 29-The Philistines Dismiss David**


• The Philistines gathered at Aphek while Israel gathered at Jezreel. David's men formed in the rear of the Philistine army.

- Earlier, the Philistines had defeated the Israelites at Aphek, took the Ark of the Covenant, and killed Eli's two sons-1 Samuel 4.
- Angered at Achish, the commanders felt David's men would <u>betray</u> them since they were Israelites.
- As a result, Achish sent David and his men home.
- It appears David wanted to fight with the Philistines against Israel.
- Perhaps, David did not seek the Lord's advice to live with Achish nor to join Achish in battle against Israel.
- David could have feigned loyalty without revealing his true <u>intentions</u>.
- By God's providence, He turned favor away from David and kept him from fighting Israel.

## **Chapter 30-David Destroys the Amalekites**




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
- When David and his men returned to camp, they discovered the <u>Amalekites</u> had raided Ziklag and had taken all their families and possessions.
- Some of David's men talked of stoning him.
- David asked the Lord as to whether he should pursue the Amalekites.
- The Lord told David to pursue the Amalekites and they would regain everything.
- David had six hundred men with him. Two hundred men, unable to continue, stayed with the luggage.
- David's <u>four hundred</u> men defeated the Amalekites and recaptured all their belongings.
- Some of the more worthless men did not want to share the spoils with the two hundred who stayed behind.
- David made a decree that whoever stayed with the baggage during war would also share the spoils of war.
- David gave some of the spoils to Israelites who had shown him favor.

## **Chapter 31-The Death of Saul**

• The Philistines slew the Israelites, Saul, and his sons on Mount Gilboa.



- Wounded badly, Saul told his armor bearer to kill him so the Philistines would not make sport of him.
- The armor bearer refused to kill Saul, so Saul drew his **sword** and killed himself.
- The Israelites fled from the Philistines and the Philistines overtook their cities.
- The Philistines cut off Saul's head, stripped off his weapons, and spread the news throughout the Philistine territory.
- The Philistines put Saul's weapons in the temple of <u>Ashtaroth</u> (goddess of fertilitythe counterpart to Baal) and fastened his body to the wall of Beth-shan.

- When the inhabitants of <u>Jabesh-gilead</u> heard what the Philistines had done, the
  valiant men of the city rose and took down the bodies of Saul and his sons and
  buried them at Jabesh.
- The people fasted for seven days.
- Earlier, Saul had rescued the people of Jabesh-gilead from the Ammonites, and they were deeply indebted to him. See chapter 11.

#### **Summary**

Saul had the potential of reigning as a mighty king. Due to his disobedience and lack of repentance, God stripped him of all glory.

As with Saul, God reaches out to every individual. He created each of us to have fellowship with Him. Without God's Spirit working within us, we cannot fully live the life He intended. Void of God's guidance, we make careless decisions, we become prideful, deceitful, hateful, full of revenge, and ultimately, God removes us from His presence.

God freely asks us to accept His son, Jesus Christ, into our lives for the forgiveness of sin. When we receive Jesus as Lord, we instantly become children of God, obtain the fullness of His Spirit, and have fellowship with Him for eternity.
